The Power of Pronouns: Cultivating Belonging

Who among us has commented, "I'm just not sure what they/them is all about"? Who has felt unsure about when and how to use pronouns in respectful and affirming ways? Who is interested in understanding the impact of honoring pronouns as it relates to affirming LGBTQ+ communities? Who has begun to hear people say, "My pronouns are..."? Who wishes they were confident in what this all means and in how to approach people to learn which pronouns they use? If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, this presentation may be for you.

In the English language, the pronoun sets people are most familiar with were created within a binary (two sets), like night/day, good/bad, and he/she. For people across the spectrum of gender identities (e.g., gender non-conforming, non-binary, and transgender), the binary set of pronouns may not fit and can create discomfort, stress, and anxiety. Imagine someone calling you by a pronoun that does not align for how you want to be referred to. Imagine them doing it over and over, even after you've corrected them. The effect of using someone's personal pronouns is profound. You are saying, "I accept you, embrace you being you, and desire to honor you in the way you want to be honored."

Join us as we return to our elementary school education around pronouns and connect to the "unlearning and relearning" of possibilities related to pronoun usage. As we establish awareness, we will learn about the importance of respecting pronouns and engaging in a practice of inclusivity. Leading, loving, and living with intentionality is the essence of this presentation.

Jen Murray (they/them/theirs) is a dedicated LGBTQ+ speaker with 17+ years in the field of LGBTQ+ executive education. They have experience locally, regionally, nationally, and globally in leveraging equity practices and fostering a sense of belonging. Jen is the Founder/C.E.O (Centered Energetic Optimist) of the High Vibe Healing Collective. Their heart-centered leadership approach seeks to breathe new ways of being into the world: inviting communities to explore interconnections, the commitment to collective healing, and the potential toward dignity and humanity. Jen will provide perspectives that enhance group culture and inspire us to connect in creative ways to integrate intentional practices that bolster inclusivity.

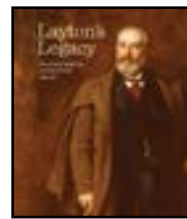

Pride of the Frontier-Milwaukee's 19th Century Art Collectors

As Milwaukee transformed itself from a frontier town to a thriving metropolis in the last quarter of the 19th century, a number of individuals sought to bring polish and sophistication to the city. John C. Eastberg's lecture will trace the rise of Milwaukee's leading art collectors of the day, including Martha Mitchell, William Metcalf, Frederick Layton, and Frederick Pabst and how the artistic treasures they acquired in the 19th century are still known to us to this day.

John C. Eastberg was born and raised in Southern California and moved to Milwaukee, his father's hometown, in 1989 to attend Cardinal Stritch University. He then attended Marquette University and received a master's degree in 19th century American History with an emphasis on the Gilded Age. He began as the historian of the Pabst Mansion in 1993 and is presently its Historian Emeritus. Currently, John is also the principal of Eastberg Historical Consulting and is maintaining an archive focusing on the history of the Schlitz Brewing Company and Milwaukee's Uihlein family. In addition, he has authored three books on Milwaukee history and is currently composing two further works.

"Where do we go next?" was the question on the lips of the members who spent four nights in Washington DC at the gracious Hay Adams hotel in September. We had a wonderful time reacquainting and introducing ourselves as travel friends. Highlights included: a monument tour at night in 6-person golf carts; visits to the beautiful and historic Library of Congress; lesser-known historic sites and gallery visits to the Freer, National Gallery, and Phillips Collection. Who would believe that on our last night on an Uber ride from Georgetown a half dozen of seasoned travel members found themselves ejected by an Uber driver over confusion that the 6 seats ordered be provided by using the front seat. Another Uber driver promptly came to the rescue. Another story is added to the travel annals to bring laughs and fond memories for years to come.

Are you interested in learning to play bridge OR refreshing your bridge game after being away from the game for a while? The Club will arrange for lessons with Wes Ernie, a favorite bridge teacher of past years, if there is interest. Lessons will be \$15 per two-hour session and will be held on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons.

BEGINNING PLAYERS: Designed for people who haven't played bridge and would like to learn the fundamentals of bidding the modern style, playing the hand, and basics of bridge as it is played at this time. An eight-lesson session is needed for continuity. The cost of the eight weeks is \$120.

REFRESHING PLAYERS: Designed for people who have played bridge sometime in their past but have not played recently or for those who have not learned the method commonly known as "Post Goren" or "Audrey Grant" which changes how bidding has been done in years past. Perhaps you haven't played bridge in quite a while and would like to refresh your game? This is a five week-session with a total cost of \$75.
